A Challenging Day On A Blustery Bridgwater Canal, April 10th

It was another trip down south and back to the Bridgwater & Taunton canal for this event. This time we were on the 'Wides' section at The Hope & Anchor Inn. The stretch should have been closed off to club anglers but that didn't stop 5 of them taking up some of the better pegs. Well, the most surprising thing of the day was that we only saw one paddle boarder all

day. There was no boat traffic and very few walkers and cyclists but the real pain in the backside was the strong wind, which was blowing from left to right all the way down the canal. This made bait presentation difficult and as far as I am concerned it cost me a couple of good tench. However, due to the winds weights were much lower than expected and only 6lb was needed to secure the win. That went to Kev who was drawn on peg 1. We'll be visiting the Chequers stretch on July 10^{th,} which is one of my favourite river Avon venues of all time. Well, it's the only place I've ever caught 100lb of bream from despite visiting Ireland over 20 years. I suggest you bring 2 keepnets for this match... just in case. I wish I had brought 2 nets with me when I was bagging because there were still plenty more bream to be had that particularly special day.

Other matches I'm looking forward to are the Warwickshire Avon on the Away Day trip in August and the river Tone in February, 2023. The Warks Avon has a large head of big chub, a few barbel, some specimen roach, big perch and some bream in the deeper stretch. It's a float and feeder river, although some locals do use pole tactics here. The river Tone has a very large head of chub, roach and dace on the fast stretch, with an occasional grayling putting in an appearance, so you can expect a day of non-stop action (okay stop laughing you lot!). Seriously, match weights during February are often in excess of 20lb, which include chub up to 4lbs.
