The losses were soon forgotten when Bill latched into and landed 2 good bream, one going 6-13-0, which is also a heaviest river fish of the season contender. Our away day outing this year will be at Walters Lake, South Cerney. Walter's lake is a purpose built match lake. It is approx. 3 acres in size and divided into 4 lanes. We have one 18 peg lane booked for the day. The lake holds many carp in the 5-8lb size plus tench to over 7lb and bream to over 8lb. There are also many smaller silvers, so everyone will catch something. The lake match record is 446lb, with many match weights topping 300lb and it's also possible to catch 30-40lbs of silvers.
