


# Newsletter

#### Ireland 2003

For many years we have stayed and fished in the Cavan area of Ireland. In many ways, this year was different. We stayed at a guesthouse, owned and run by an English couple, situated in a tiny area called 'Kilclare'. The nearest town was Carrick-on-Shannon, about 30 minutes drive from Kilclare. Kilclare consists of 4 houses and 1 pub, so there was no real social scene. The fishing was below expectations except for Mike Teakle and Ted Bethel who

both managed to 'do the ton' on a lake called Lough Kinale (pronounced 'kin'ell). To get to the swims, we had to transport ourselves and tackle up a river, into the lake and onto a secluded shore, by boat. We also spent 4 days fishing from a secluded island called Harry's Island.
