The Bridgwater & Taunton canal is a great venue with the possibility of some big tench, bream and perch, which can come off any peg. However, it seems to have been taken over by ... "Paddle Boarders". (Oh don't get me started). As I've already voiced my opinion, let's get straight down to the nitty gritty. The day started well with just one PB passing by. Fish were being caught from every peg and the day was going swimmingly. Then more PBs turned up followed by some tiny canoes with equally tiny-brained operators and some guy in a rowing boat who couldn't keep his oars in the water. Instead, he thrashed around for a few minutes before deciding to give it up and go back, much to the embarrassment of his wife or girlfriend. Next came the guy with his wife and son on PBs. A few other tench were lost during the day by other anglers and a few were caught. I managed to land a smaller one earlier but really needed the biggie for

Swanborough with 8-8-0. Ian liked the venue so much he decided to go in for an early dip

The Knight Finds Some Hidden Treasure Under A Tree On The Crane. October 10th

It was back on the Crane stretch for the W.Milton Cup and our interclub with Alcove who turned up with 3 hopefuls against a platoon of 12 hardened river rod benders. No contest! Well, as usual everyone wanted to draw a high number, especially on this one as the river definitely looked quite breamy. Steve, Clive and Jason drew the hot favourite pegs but unfortunately the bream didn't put in an appearance. Steve "silvers" Dawson drew a peg with a wasp nest and so moved, only to find another wasp nest. Finally he gave up and went home. Alcove, now having lost their star player were up against it. I drew peg 7, which has a willow tree protruding from the left-hand side, and which takes up a fair area of the swim. At first I moaned a bit and then when I hooked into the tree I moaned a lot but when I got myself sorted and started fishing close in with a Crowquill at 10 feet deep and just off the edge of the tree branches I started catching. Then when I began feeding quite heavily, I started catching quality fish, mainly roach and perch. Every now and again a pike would swirl around and unsettle the fish but I just left it alone for a few minutes and then resumed catching. So, it seemed the fish were all hiding under the tree branches and would come out to grab a few maggots and then dart back again. I'm so glad that tree was there because it served up a winning weight of 10-2-0 for me. Tony Humphries, who is definitely the most improved angler of the season, put 9-13-0 on the scales for a convincing second place. His catch included a specimen chub but he didn't get it weighed. Paul Wyatt also had a decent chub in his catch, which weighed a total of 7-11-0, for third place. Section wins went to Alcove's Tony Welsby with 5-12-0 and Jason Pitman

with 6-3-0. It was a frightfully nice day all round I'd say
